A Risk Evaluation and Mitigation Strategy (REMS) is a program to manage known or potential serious risks associated with a drug product and is required by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to ensure that the benefits of a drug outweigh its risks. The FDA has required a REMS for opioid analgesics.

Science Naloxone is a safe, opioid antagonist with the ability to rapidly reverse the effect of opioids. It can be safely and effectively administered intranasally or intramuscularly with little training. On September 18, 2018, the FDA approved the Opioid Analgesic Risk Evaluation and Mitigation Strategy (REMS) program to reduce the risk of abuse, misuse, addiction, overdose, and deaths due to prescription opioid analgesics while maintaining access to pain medications.
