Many of Shakespeare's plays give an idea of the stage properties and special effects which would have been used. A candle, a cauldron and a severed head would have been used as props in Macbeth, and rapiers, a book and a skull would have been used in Hamlet. Severed heads must have been part of the stage properties in Shakespeare's playing company because many of his history plays include beheading as a form of execution.

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Special Effects. Playwrights in Shakespeare's time used language to describe 'special effects' much of the time; but acting companies could also produce very dramatic special effects. Thunder and lightning filled the theatre for storms. There were a variety of effects to suggest magic was at

work. Many special effects needed special ingredients. Buying these made a performance more expensive, so special effects were not used all the time.

Beginning in the late 1800s, Shakespeare's plays inspired the creation of a wealth of replica Elizabethan theaters, more or less faithful to what was known of the theatrical past. Dozens of open-air Shakespeare festivals have also grown up across the United States and other countries. Shakespeare's works have also been frequently interpreted on film.

Shakespeare's company built the Globe only because it could not use the special roofed facility, Blackfriars Theatre, that James Burbage (the father of their leading actor, Richard Burbage) had built in 1596 for it inside the city. The elder Burbage had a long history as a theatrical entrepreneur. In 1576 he had built the first successful amphitheatre, known as The Theatre, in a London suburb.

Though special effects and costumes could get pretty elaborate, the actual set dressing of Shakespeare's Globe Theater was quite spare. According to the Folger Shakespeare Library, there's little evidence that the acting company at the Globe put much effort into set design. Actors would have had pieces of furniture, like chairs and tables, necessary to carry out directions in the script.
